



AN ASSUMPTIONIST PASSION

Many wonder what the Assumptionist way of living the Gospel entails. Think of someone like Saint Francis. His way was to focus on the goodness of all creation and of the simplest and poorest of people.

Think of Saint Thomas Aquinas. He focused on the truth of the Gospel, and for all his life he worked to understand and communicate this truth.

We can say that for Fr. Emmanuel d'Alzon, the founder of the Assumptionists, and especially for Saint Augustine, whom Fr. d'Alzon admired more than any other Catholic thinker and saint, the special focus is on the beauty of the Gospel.

Augustine invites us to fall in love with that beauty and specifically with Jesus Christ. Father d'Alzon, with different words, tells us to work for the coming of God's reign, out of love for Jesus Christ. That was the motto he gave to the Assumptionists: Thy Kingdom Come (in Latin, *Adveniat Regnum Tuum*).

Assumptionists long to see God's Kingdom established in their own hearts and in the hearts of those around them. And they do this for love of Jesus Christ, who came to establish the reign of God's love among us. A passion to live for God's Kingdom within us and around us is what defines our Assumptionist spirit.





PRAYING WITH THE KINGDOM AWARENESS EXERCISE

Since the Assumptionists long to see God's Kingdom established in their own hearts and in the world around them, many of them end the day by reflecting on the ways they might have helped or perhaps even hindered the coming of that Kingdom during the day. They call this the "Kingdom Awareness Exercise."

Here is how it is done:

Preparation

In a quiet place, take a minute or two to praise God for His goodness and thank Him for His blessings. Then ask for the light you'll need in order to see as God sees.

Meditative reflection

For five minutes or so, with God's help, try to answer these questions: How have you worked with God in building up the Kingdom, in your own heart and in the world around you? Have you seen God at work in a special way? Have you stood in the way of what God is trying to do?

Conclusion

In prayer, humbly acknowledge any shortcoming you have detected, and most especially be aware of God's mercy. Entrust yourself to God's care and ask that more and more you take on the mind and heart of Jesus.
